Domestic Violence Action Coalition Meeting Notes September 18, 2017, Covina Woman's Club Janice Masters, DVAC Reporter

About DVAC

Retired police officers Kim Plater and Alice Slaughter co-chair this organization which helps victims of domestic violence and sexual assault through legal advocacy and referral to local agencies that can help them. DVAC, which meets at noon on the third Monday of each month at the Covina Woman's Club, also collects donations of cash, clothing, food, and other items to support those agencies that are helping these women and children. At Lucille's request, each month I will summarize the highlights of our meeting so you know what we're doing, and what you may want to do, to further DVAC's mission. Our next meeting, if you'd like to check it out, will be on Wednesday, Oct. 18th at 12 pm.

BACA

A presentation by Bikers Against Child Abuse (BACA) was scheduled for this last meeting but was canceled because the presenters had to appear in court with a child their organization is assisting. Though it surprises most folks who hear about it for the first time—you can imagine the initial skepticism of DVAC's founders as retired police—this is a reputable, international organization that advocates for child abuse victims (Google BACA for more information). The group may present at our next meeting, Monday, Oct. 18, if they are not appearing in court again.

Legislation

Legislation discussed included AB 41, which helps make law enforcement agencies accountable for using available DNA evidence from rape kits in sexual assault cases.
